



Community Foundation Awards \$1,768,987 in Grants LARGEST AMOUNT *in* ORGANIZATION'S HISTORY

The investment the **Walker Area Community Foundation** makes in our community is important to overall community health. The Foundation recently awarded grants to the following organizations:

Alabama Lions Sight is the largest provider of indigent eye care in Alabama, serving communities with their mobile eye clinic. A grant for the mobile clinic supports the operation in Sumiton, Sipsey and Jasper, providing services to 432 individuals in a year. *CF, DDFF*

Alabama Possible received a grant to support college enrollment and to ensure all students complete FAFSA, with an expected impact for 820 seniors. *CF*

Funding for **Alzheimer's of Central Alabama** provides incontinence products delivered directly to homes in Walker County. *CF, DDFF*

A grant to **Backyard Blessings** will provide weekend food to over 1,350 students in Walker County. *BF, DDFF, LDF, LF, SLSF, TDLF, RFF*

Bevill State Community College received a grant for the restoration of the Rowland Center. *CF, DDFF*

Birmingham Zoo received funding for the Alabama Wilds Raptor Habitat. *CF, BF*

Boldo United Methodist Church Food Bank received a grant for their emergency food pantry that serves about 200 people. *CF, LDF*

Bundles of Hope Diaper Bank received a grant to provide diapers and wipes to around 3,000 households in Walker County with the help of their distribution partners. *CF, DDFF, RFF*

A grant to **Camp COOL**, in collaboration with Camp McDowell's Bethany Village, will provide a four-day summer camp experience for local children who have spina bifida and cerebral palsy. *SLSF*

Capstone Rural Health received a grant to staff the Healing Network and the Viking Clinic. *DDFF, LDF, PDDF, LF, TDLF*

A grant to the **Carl Elliott Regional Library** will fund their summer reading program. *SLSF*

Christian's Place Mission received funding for their food bank, serving over 4,000 people annually. *CF, BF, RFF*

The **City of Cordova** received a grant to continue improvements to the Mill Park recreation area. *CF, DTS*

A grant to **Community Grief Support** provides materials and administration for their program, which serves 2,500 individuals. *CF*

The Crisis Center received funding for the Walker County Recovery Resource Center that will provide support for clients in need of referrals. Expected to serve 500 people in the first year. *CF, DDFF, LDF, LF*

Dilworth Church of God Food Bank received a grant to provide groceries to around 6,000 households annually. *CF, RFF*

Fellowship House provides services to address the opioid crisis through counseling and treatment. Funding will enhance available services in Walker County. *DDFF, LDF*

A grant to the **First United Methodist Church Hope Kitchen** will provide a hot meal to around 200 individuals each week. *CF, BF, LF, RFF*

Foundry Ministries provides addiction recovery programming in a residential setting and will provide these services to 30 Walker County individuals. *LDF, LF, RFF*

Freshwater Land Trust manages and protects conservation land in and around Walker County and received a grant to ensure the land is cared for and the water quality meets standards. *CF*

Friends of Downtown Jasper/Jasper Main Street received a grant to fund operations and downtown projects. *CF, BF, DDFF, LDF, PDDF, LF, RFF*

Girls Inc received a grant for their summer enrichment program, offering activities for 115 girls. *CF, BF, SLSF*

The Greater Birmingham Humane Society was funded to operate the Jasper shelter, providing care to 1,200 abused, neglected, injured and abandoned animals every year. *CF*

Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL) received a grant to provide health and nutrition programs in 11 Walker County schools. *BF, DDFF, LDF*

Hope House Church Soup Kitchen and Homeless Program received a grant to fund their soup kitchen, showers for the homeless, diaper bank, emergency groceries and youth cooking classes, providing services to around 5,800 individuals annually. *CF, BF, RFF*

Funding for **Kid One Transport** ensures they can continue to provide transportation for Walker County children and pregnant mothers to doctor and hospital visits. *SLSF*

Laura Crandall Brown Foundation was awarded a grant to support GYN cancer patients with financial assistance and hope. *CF, LDF*

The Literacy Council of Central Alabama was funded to provide local programs for Walker County students and adults, including book clubs, ESL classes and tutoring, serving around 8,000 individuals annually. *CF, BF, TDLE, RFF*

The **Main Street Ministries** food bank received a grant to purchase food for 1,500 people annually. *CF, LDF, RFF*

Pregnancy Test and Resource Center received a grant for Baby Boot Camp for 200 young mothers and families. *CF, BF, RFF*

Raising Arrows received a grant to provide year-round scholarships for youth in Walker County during spring break, summer and after school. *DDFF, LF, TDLE, RFF*

Ronald McDonald House was funded to provide housing for families of children receiving treatment at Children’s Hospital. *TDLF*

The **Salvation Army** received funding to support their food pantry and homeless services, with an overall expected impact to 2,100 clients. *DDFF, PDDF, RFF*

St. Cecilia Catholic Church Fond Pantry received a grant to fund their program. *CF, RFF*

St. Mary’s Episcopal Church Food Bank provides groceries, fresh produce and meat to around 20,000 households in a year. *CF, BF, DDFF, LDF, RFF*

Town of Parrish received a grant to make improvements to their community center. *CF, BF, RFF*

UAB Department of Theatre received a grant to bring performances to Walker County. *CF*

The **United Way of Central Alabama** received a grant to support mental health and recreational opportunities in Walker County. *CF, DTS*

University of Alabama Whole Child Partnership received funding for staff positions in Walker County with a focus on improving student outcomes. *DDFF, LDF*

Walker County Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) provides communication support during disasters and received a grant for operational support. *CF, BF*

Walker County Community Action received a grant for their “SKY” After School and Summer Program for 90 students. *CF, BF, DDFF, RFF, SLSF*

A grant to the **Walker County Department of Human Resources** provides for the special needs of foster children and elderly clients. *CF, BF, DDFF*

The **Walker County Humane Society** received a grant to improve the health and well-being of area animals. *CF, BF, RFF*

Walker County Sheriff’s Office received a grant to purchase short -range binoculars. *CF, BF*

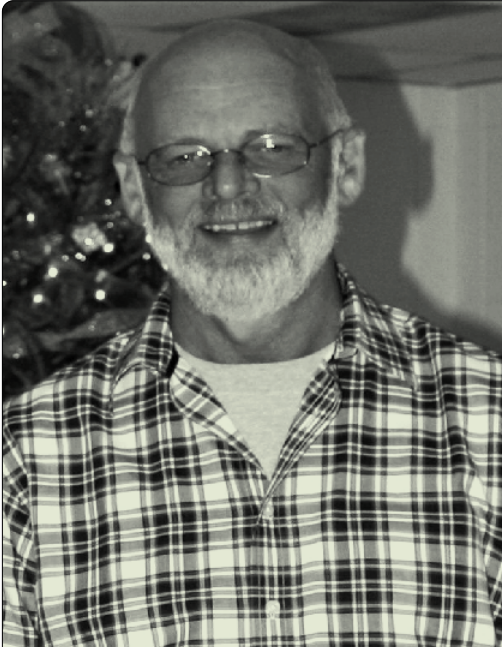
Wellhouse rescues and rehabilitates women and adolescents who are victims of human trafficking. Their grant will enhance services available to Walker County victims. *CF*

Clyde "Sappo" Black is a Jasper native who passed away in 2005 at age 78. Sappo grew up in the Cotton Mill Village in Jasper and had family in Union Chapel and Cordova. Walker County was his home, and he was very proud of that fact.

Mr. Black had a rich history of helping others. During the 1960s, the Eldridge Children's Home had a need of transportation, and they came to Sappo to request help in purchasing a bus. Mr. Black, who had a heart for helping children and saw the needs of others above his own, was happy to make their dream a reality.

In the late 1960s and through the 80s, the Special Olympics started to take off, and George Lindsey proposed he and Sappo raise money for the organization. Together, alongside countless volunteers, they brought awareness to the Special Olympics by hosting a golf tournament. George Lindsey and Sappo, with the help of their community, helped raise more than one million dollars.

"We wouldn't be here at all without dad, and what better way to honor him long after we are gone and continue on his path of giving back. He could light up any room yet stay under the radar at the same time. He was incredibly humble. 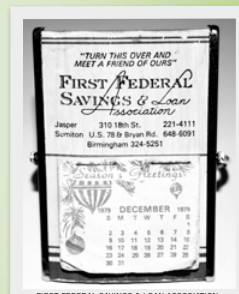
